 Provide guidance, supervision, and a "home base"


 Enable on-the-ground delivery of programming specific to a community or watershed



Funding

- Canada Summer Jobs is a funding program delivered by Employment and Social Development Canada
- OFAH works with a community partner and applies to this program for funding
- If successful, the student hired is an OFAH employee; however, they work out of the community partner's office
 - Contracts can be 6-16 weeks long

Case Study #1: Manitoulin Island







- Estimated number of contacts reached = 60,000
- Visited 40 parks, resorts, marinas, museums, township offices, information centres
- Worked with Ontario
 Stewardship Rangers
- Six newspaper articles featured in three different newspapers
- Radio interview given on 100.7 The Island

Case Study #2: Durham Region








- 8 public outreach events (e.g., fishing derby, community presentation, interpretive programs, info booths)
 - Monitored 25 SWMP for invasive species
- Coordinated invasive species removal from Enniskillin Conservation Area




Achievements

 On the ground delivery of 118 events in 2017

Hit Squad: 2006-2017

- Received >\$810,00 in funding from CSJ
- hired and trained 259 students
 - Many have continued their careers in the environmental field
- Built relationships with 53 partners
 - With this small investment, partners have built/expanded invasive species programs in their community
