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




Water Chestnut Biology


- Annual, from seeds
- Slower water, depths <16 ft
- Multiple rosettes on one plant
- Single plant produces enough seeds for >100 plants next year







Ability to Spread



Impacts of Water Chestnut

- Prevents recreation
- Alters water temperature and chemistry
- Limits fish and bird habitat







Erie Canal



Initial Discovery

- June 26, 2008
 - 60% coverage of a 6 acre area
- 1,880 lbs removed by hand pulling





The Second Year


- 2,500 lbs removed
- 3-4,000 lbs remain



Characteristics

- Annual plant overwinters by seed
- Grows to form dense mats
- · Leaves are glossy and green
- Triangular leaves with toothed edges
 Feathery submerged leaves
- Plants produce large, green seeds with four sharp spines in summer
- Floating black nuts will not sprout

- Removed 151,000 lbs






Beginnings of Success
